The Roadshow is a pre-conference activity and is well-worth obtaining the extra time off from work and extra funds (unless you are lucky enough to get a scholarship, like me!). We woke up early Monday morning and boarded a bus to embark on our two-day journey. On day one we visited the Portsmouth Children's Museum and Brock Environmental Center. I will focus my reflections on day two, however.



The second day of the Roadshow brought a visit to the Virginia Aquarium where we had the chance to explore the property and hear from several department heads. Of greatest interest to me was learning about the volunteer management system, as they have over 900 volunteers. I am just beginning to build a volunteer program at my place of work and have only a dozen active volunteers. Learning how a large volunteer program functions, from recruitment and retention to incentives and prizes to training was great. It gives me goals to strive for, though I am positive I will never reach 900 volunteers!

The last stop of the Roadshow was Back Bay National Wildlife Refuge, where they have a great programming partnership with the adjacent False Cape State Park. Seeing how well the two organizations work together to serve the public was inspiring. It makes me think about how I can partner with other museums and properties in my area to team up on interpretive programming and perhaps offer a two-part program, one at their site and one at mine.



I encourage everyone to apply for a scholarship through the Nature Center Directors and Administrators section for the 2016 workshop in Corpus Christie. Having attended the Roadshow for the first time in 2015, I am now hooked and will be saving my money so I can attend in 2016.

Interpreter's Road Show Attendance Scholarship

NCDA Section members are invited to apply for a \$500 scholarship that can be used to cover costs (Road Show registration and lump sum amount for meals) to attend the Corpus Christi Interpreter's Road Show in November, 2016. This year, the NCDA Section will offer two \$500 scholarships.

The Interpreters Road Show provides an intensive behind-the-scenes, two-day tour to a variety of nature centers, visitor centers and other interpretive facilities.

- Recipients will be chosen based on involvement in NAI and the interpretive field.
- Applicants must be individual NAI members and a member of the NCDA Section.
- Grant applications must be received by May 31.
- Applications will be evaluated and recipients will be notified of their award soon after.
- Recipients are automatically registered for the Road Show. NCDA will pay the Road Show fee and the remaining amount will be sent to the recipient for use to cover other meals during the pre-Conference time.

CIM Certification Scholarship 2016

NCDA Section members are invited to apply for a scholarship that will pay for the cost of one certification packet (value \$125), per individual in the CIM category. This year, the NCDA Section will offer one scholarship. Recipients will be chosen based on financial need, NAI involvement, and/or the desire to become certified.

Once the recipient receives the packet, he/she must complete the written certification test and provide evidences of performance to the NAI Certification Program as required. Certification is granted upon successful completion of the test and successful review of the required evidences of performance. (The NCDA Section is not responsible for evaluating or granting certification.)

Applicants must be individual NAI members and a member of the NCDA Section. Certification Category/Packet is for the Certified Interpretive Manager only.
